His career includes serving as an elected Tribal Chief on the US/Southern portion of his home community, Chief of Staff to former National Chief Ovide Mercredi, and a Director of the federal government's Aboriginal labour market development program. He has facilitated numerous economic development and corporate relationship events and projects including serving as co-author of "The Anishinabek Nation Economy: Our Economic Blueprint. He currently serves as the Speaker and Co-Chair for the Assembly of First Nations annual and special Chiefs' Assemblies. He is a resident in Coast Salish Territory.



# **MEETING OVERVIEW**

#### Background

#### Position Statement (2023)

In 2023, two Special Joint Meetings were coordinated with participation of Elders, the SLFNHA Board, CCOH, and Tribal Councils. The focus of the meetings was to discuss Health Transformation and to help determine how to move forward in the region. From these discussions, elements of a strategy were put into a Draft Position Statement.

#### Position Statement on First Nations Authority and Control over Health for the Sioux Lookout area First Nations

The current health care system, which operates under colonial structures and policies, continues to fail us as we administer a foreign system that is inconsistent with Anishinabe ways. The Chiefs Council of Health (CCOH) and SLFNHA Board are hereby putting Ontario and Canada on notice that we will no longer accept processes that are founded on a program -by-program basis, whereby the governments off -load their responsibility while maintaining the power and control over our people and organizations. These processes must be replaced with processes that take a whole system approach and that bring authority back to First Nations people through meaningful participation. This will include a clear transition plan to ensure current progress is various program areas is not disrupted and will not interfere with existing processes.

Recommendation 1

- The SLFNHA Board and CCOH recommend that SLFNHA further develop a position paper based on the above position statement to be presented to both levels of government. It is further recommended that SLFNHA work with their First Nations partners to come to a mutual understanding on the big picture and to come together to build the foundation. This will include further development of a strategy with the following elements: 1) Nation Driven Decision -Making Processes 2) Systems Planning Through Multi -Lateral Negotiations 3) Identification of the Role of Devolution/Transfer 4) Assert our Traditional Governance and Protect our Treaty and Inherent Rights. 5) Legal Strategy to Address Discrimination in the health care system.
- This strategy will then be presented to the SLFNHA Chiefs in Assembly at an upcoming Special Chiefs Assembly.

Recommendation 2

The SLFNHA Board and CCOH recommend that engagement be done in collaboration with Tribal Councils
and communities to make sure that it builds upon existing work and processes. This will include clear
communication and partnerships to identify clear roles of all partners to move forward on a united path
including an oversight process. This will recognize traditional governance and be inclusive of all rights
holders, on and off reserve.

#### **Resolution 23-07**

At the SLFNHA 2023 AGM, the Chiefs in Assembly Passed Resolution 23-07 adopting the Position Statement and the recommendation to host a Special Chiefs and Elders meeting on Health Transformation to further develop a full position paper and strategy.



#### ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

#### Resolution #23-07

Adoption of Position Statement on Fire '4a, " or " Har rity and Control over Health for the Slows Look out area First Nations

WHEREAS, the current health care system, which operates under colonial structures and policies, continues to fail us as we administer a foreign system that is inconsistent with Anishinabe ways; and

WHEREAS, Resolution 15-23 Coll for the Declaration of a Public Health Emergency directed the Sioux Lookout First Nations Health Authority (SLENHA) to advocate for a declaration of emergency to be issued and for a process to address the numerous health issues listed in resolution 15-23; and

WHEREAS, Resolution 16-09 SLFNHA and CCOH Porticipation in NAN Health Transformation Process acknowledged the role of SLFNHA and the Chiefs Committee on Health (CCOH) as a health planning authority with extensive knowledge of how health services are delivered and with a comprehensive understanding of the health issues in communities; and

WHEREAS, Resolution 16-09 further directs that the SLFNHA and the CCOH participate with Nishnawbe Aski Nation (NAN) in "the alignment process that will gather decision-makers to move health transformation forward in a deliberate, planned and measurable way" and the CCOH participate with NAN at the Joint Action Table and any other high-level decision-making tables; and

WHEREAS, Resolution 22-28 Prioritization of Community Based Health Services and Review of Anishinabe Health Plan calls for a significant shift in the organization of the health care system to ensure that resources are close to home and that a review of the Anishinabe Health Plan be conducted; and

WHEREAS, SLFNHA has hosted two special meetings in 2023 of the SLFNHA Board of Directors, the CCOH and Tribal Councils to develop a pathway forward for transforming the regional health care system. The participants developed a Draft Position Statement and recommendations.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Chiefs in Assembly adopt the Position Statement on First Nations Authority and Control over Health for the Sioux Lookout area First Nations which states that SLFNHA Board and CCOH will put both levels of government "on notice that we will no longer accept processes that are founded on a program-by-program basis, whereby the governments off-load their responsibility while maintaining power and control over our people and organizations" and that these processes must be replaced with a whole system approach that brings authority back to First Nations people.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Chiefs in Assembly adopt the recommendations in the Position Statement and direct SUFNHA to host a special Chiefs and Elders meeting on Health Transformation to further develop a full position paper and strategy to be presented to the Chiefs in Assembly at a future date.

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that the Chiefs in Assembly direct SLFNHA to further engage with First Nations partners, including NAN and Tribal Councils to develop a coordinated and aligned approach to achieve a transformed regional health system for the Sioux Lookout area First Nations.

Once he became the Member of Provincial Parliament (MPP) for the Kiiwetinoong riding, his advocacy for First Nations has been broadened to address barriers in all systems impacting First Nations. Sol will share his experiences and wisdom in advocating for First Nations sovereignty and decolonization of current systems.

Samuel is a strong advocate for First Nation's rights and he was also a member of the KI-6, a group of 6 community members were were jailed for protecting and fighting for their lands. Samuel has also been instrumental in the development and implementation of Kitchenuhmaykoosib Inninuwug Dibenjikewin Onaakonikewin (KIDO). Samuel will provide a grassroots community perspective on asserting traditional governance.

**Sara Mainville** is a Partner at JFK Law LLP situated in Toronto, ON. She is a proud member of the Anishinaabe Nation in Treaty 3 and Couchiching First Nation. She has been called to the Ontario bar since 2005 and went to Queen's Law (LL.B) and UofT (LL.M).
